Next week we enter the liturgical season of Lent. Lent is more frequently seen as a time of solemn observance and preparation for the celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ at Easter. From its start on Ash Wednesday (14th February 2024) until its conclusion on Easter Sunday, Lent is a traditional time for fasting or giving something up or abstinence. Just as we carefully prepare for events in our personal lives, such as a wedding or birthday, Lent invites us to make our minds and hearts ready for remembering Jesus' life, death and resurrection.

On Wednesday we are delighted to be welcoming Fr. Mark in to school to preside over our Ash Wednesday Eucharists to be held in the school halls. Parents/carers are very welcome to attend.

The EYFS/Reception, Year 1, Year 2 & Year 3 Ash Wednesday Eucharist (including class ashing) will take place at 9:15a.m. in the KS1 Hall.

The Year 4, Year 5 & Year 6 Ash Wednesday Eucharist (including ashing) will take place at 10:45a.m. in the KS2 Hall.

There will also be the imposition of ashes for those that wish to receive the sign of the cross on their forehead.

In your preparations you may decide to give up just one item for Lent, more commonly a 'luxury' such as chocolate! It is also becoming increasingly common for people to give up other things in order to refocus their faith during this time; such as watching TV, going to the gym, even computer games! And, of course, more and more Christians are turning to the **40acts challenge** as a way of doing Lent differently; using simple daily reflections and acts of generosity as a way of putting others first during preparations for Easter. After half term we will be exploring the 40acts challenge with the children in collective worship – ask your children to talk to you about it!

Respect For School Property

It saddens me to have to share with parents and carers our growing concerns over lack of respect for school property. This has become a particular issue with the way our children are behaving and treating the Key Stage 2 main toilet block (off of the Lower School playground). In recent weeks we have had broken toilet cubicles, graffiti on the walls, whole toilet rolls put down the toilet and toilet rolls removed from the individual cubicles. The staff have spoken at length with the children about this lack of respect for school property and Mrs Coughtrey (Deputy Headteacher) has also spoken with Key Stage 2 children collectively about this anti-social behaviour. This behaviour is distressing to adults and children and is costly to the school in repairing damage and replacing items that go missing. We take great pride in our school and are blessed to have such a proactive premises team, led by Mr Powis (Caretaker) who keep our school so clean, tidy and well maintained.

Needless to say, we are monitoring this area of the school very carefully and will take decisive action if any child/ren are caught damaging the school premises. Please can I ask you as parents/carers to reinforce the message at home about how we treat our school with decency and respect. I am confident that this type of behaviour is not displayed in your own bathrooms at home! Thank you for your support and cooperation in this matter.



Do You Have Time To Spare?


One of the most important skills we learn at school, a skill for life long learning, is being able to read! We have many confident and avid readers across the primary school and our two school libraries are a credit to our learning environment and stocked with rich and varied texts.

For our younger children in EYFS and Key Stage 1, reading on a regular (daily) basis is so important. Practising their key word vocabulary, phonic skills and decoding are all things that take determination and focus. I am aware that many parents/carers support their children with reading at home and this is greatly valued and appreciated.

However, for some children they need more opportunities to read to an adult and we are hoping that there may be some parents/carers who could spare an hour a week to come in to school and hear the children read in the classroom. This opportunity would be predominantly in EYFS and Key Stage 1 (Year 1 & 2) and be in the afternoon. No prior experience is necessary, just a willingness to sit with a child and hear them read offering support and encouragement.

If this is something you feel you could commit to on a regular basis then please contact the School Office with your details and when you would be available to volunteer in school. Volunteers would be subject to a DBS safeguarding check before undertaking this role. I do hope some of you will give consideration to this very worthwhile opportunity.

World Book Day 2024



I am sure many of you will have noticed from the dates issued back in January that $\underline{Thursday}$ $\underline{Z^{th} March}$ is World Book Day 2024. As we have done in previous years we are hoping to be able to celebrate this day by inviting your children to dress up! This is a day devoted to celebrating good books and literature and I hope we can do this in style! You may also have spotted that on Tuesday 5^{th} March we are very excited to be welcoming an author (James Campbell) in to school to work with the children.

The children will be undertaking lots of book related activities in their classrooms across the course of World Book Day, and to get them in the spirit we are asking them to come to school dressed as one of their favourite book characters. The emphasis is once again on simple costumes and you do not need to go to great lengths or vast expense to provide a costume for this day. The children can wear their costumes to school and it would be even better if they could bring a copy of the book from which their character comes. Please bear in mind that the children will be completing normal lessons throughout the day so the costume needs to be practical for school. For the same reason we ask that the children do not wear hair dye or make up. The staff are going to join in with the fun and festivities and I am sure we are all looking forward to seeing what costumes and characters emerge! The children do not need to pay anything to dress up and at the end of the day they will come home with their World Book Day voucher which they can exchange at a local book shop for one of the World Book Day special titles or money off a full-priced book.

Saturday morning allows us to walk the Stations of the Cross at 10.15, an excellent Lenten discipline that challenges us as we walk with Jesus during those last moments of his earthly life as he goes from standing before Pilate to the place of execution.

Sunday 18th February will be the First Sunday of Lent.
