Do You Have Time To Spare?

One of the most important skills we learn at school, a skill for life long learning, is being able to read! We have many confident and avid readers across the primary school and our two school libraries are a credit to our learning environment and stocked with rich and varied texts.

For our younger children in EYFS and Key Stage 1, reading on a regular (daily) basis is so important. Practising their key word vocabulary, phonic skills and decoding are all things that take determination and focus. I am aware that many parents/carers support their children with reading at home and this is greatly valued and appreciated. However, for some children they need more opportunities to read to an adult and we are hoping that there may be some parents/carers who could spare an hour a week to come in to school and hear the children read in the classroom. This opportunity would be predominantly in EYFS and Key Stage 1 (Year 1 & 2) and be in the afternoon. No prior experience is necessary, just a willingness to sit with a child and hear them read offering support and encouragement.



World Book Day 2025

I am sure many of you will have noticed from the dates issued back in January that <u>Thursday 6th March 2025</u> is World Book Day 2025. We also sent out further details on 23rd January with a letter from Mrs Coughtrey about the exciting events taking place across the course of this day. As we have done in previous years, we are hoping to be able to celebrate this day by inviting your children to dress up! This is a day devoted to celebrating good books and literature and I hope we can do this in style! This year we are linking World Book Day to British Science Week...so there is a decidedly scientific theme!

The children will be undertaking lots of science and book related activities across the course of World Book Day, and to get them in the spirit we are asking them to come to school dressed as their favourite scientist or a

character from a science fiction book (or anything with a science theme!). The emphasis is once again on simple costumes and you do not need to go to great lengths or vast expense to provide a costume for this day. The children can wear their costumes to school and it would be even better if they could bring a copy of the book from which their character comes. Please bear in mind that the children will be completing normal lessons throughout the day so the costume needs to be practical for school. For the same reason we ask that the children do not wear hair dye or make up. The staff are going to join in with the fun and festivities and I am sure we are all looking forward to seeing what costumes and characters emerge! At the end of the day they will come home with their World Book Day voucher which they can exchange at a local book shop for one of the World Book Day special titles or money off a full-priced book.

This Sunday we begin to look forward to the season of Lent as this Sunday is known as the Fourth Sunday before Lent. It is still in what we call Ordinary Time, so green vestments are worn when we celebrate the Eucharist and the church is lit up with green lights. In our readings, we reflect on what it means to be called by Jesus as we hear the story of the call of Jesus' first disciples as Jesus calls them to put aside their nets as they are to become fishers of men. All are welcome as we gather for worship as follows

08.00 Said Mass (lasting about 45 minutes)

10.00 Sung Mass (lasting about 75 minutes)

18.00 Choral Evensong (lasting around 50 minutes)

In the week that follows,

Wednesday mornings are always 'Cake and a Cuppa' when friends old and new gather to catch up on the news and enjoy a slice of delicious homemade cake. This runs from 10.00 to 12.00 and some will stay on for the 12.15 Mass.
